WATER COMMISSIONERS' REPORT

To the Citizens of the Water District of Acton:

In rendering our annual report for the fiscal year ending March 1st, it may be wise to give more than bare figures, to thoroughly understand the financial condition of the District.

There have been installed 28 new services, divided nearly equal between the West and South Districts, at a total cost of \$1935.90, of which the District's share is \$1262.18, or an average for each service of \$45.08, and the owners' share is \$673.72, or an average of \$24.06 for each service. The number installed is much larger than for several years.

In accordance with the vote taken at the special meeting of the District on August 2, 1923, we have extended the six-inch main in Arlington Street, commencing at the end of the pipe line near the house of Samuel F. Carlisle, and continuing 700 feet, installing one new hydrant near the end of the line, at a total cost of \$1724.35, issuing five notes of \$300.00 each, payable in from one to five years. The cost of this extension is \$2.40 per foot, including materials and labor. The labor cost figures 79 cents per foot, which is considerable less than it could be done by contract work. Three bids were submitted for the work, ranging from \$1.00 to \$1.50 per foot. We were fortunate in not finding any ledge, but the heavy rains that occurred while under construction, cost us, at least estimate, 8 cents per foot additional, owing to serious cave-ins and labor pumping.

The repairs at the pumping station were very heavy, owing to the fact that both engines, at nearly the same time, developed serious cracks in cylinder water jackets, necessitating new cylinders and pistons for each engine. These repairs, together with new equipment, such as forced feed oilers for

both engines, a two-horsepower motor and air compressor, electric light installation, new gears for the pumps and installing the old forced feed oilers on the pumps, cost \$2056.16. While this cost was heavy for one year's repair work, we feel that in many respects the power plant is in better condition, and will not call for any major repairs for several years.

We also wish to call attention to the result of the vote passed at the annual meeting in 1923, "that the dates of reading water meters and collecting water rates be changed from January 1st and July 1st to April 1st and October 1st." This change forced us to collect only nine months' water rates instead of twelve months, so that the revenue from services is some \$2200.00 less than if a full year's rate had been collected. This loss, together with our unusually heavy repair and maintenance expenses, explains the small cash balance this year as compared to the balance of a year ago. Owing to these facts we recommend the raising of \$3500.00 by taxation the present year.

Owing to the District's continued growth, thereby calling for more constant care and labor, and that his own business demands his increased attention, our superintendent, Mr. James Fitzgerald, has deemed it wise to resign his position and we have employed Mr. George E. Clapp to fill the vacancy. Mr. Fitzgerald has given many years of faithful service, beings always on the job, giving the District a sense of security in case of emergency. He has taken no vacation during this time, and at times of repair, when it called for continuous pumping night and day, that the District might not be without water pressure, he has stayed by the pumps without complaint or extra pay, deeming the satisfaction that the District had never, during his service, been without water pressure, a sufficient reward. His knowledge and care of the pumping plant has been appreciated by the Board, as well as by the citizenry, and while we lose his labor, his advice and experience will be available to the District as necessity may require.

Any causes for complaint, or if leaks should occur, you will please notify the superintendent, Mr. Clapp, at the pumping station, call West Acton 37-4, or call either of the commissioners.
