AN ACT RELATING TO THE SALARY AND COMPENSTION OF ASSESSORS AND COLLECTORS FOR SERVICES WHEN ASSESSING AND COLLECTING DISTRICT TAXES.

Be it enacted, etc., as follows:

Chapter 41 of the General Laws is hereby amended by inserting after section 108A, as amended by chapter 351 of the acts of 1948, the following section: -Section 108B. In a town in which a fire, water or improvement district has been created and is operating under a law which requires the assessors of the town to assess district taxes and the collector of taxes of the town to collect such taxes, such district shall annually appropriate money for the salary or compensation of the assessors and collector of taxes, which shall be in addition to the amounts fixed by the town for salary or compensation as provided by section one hundred and eight. The amounts appropriated for said purposes shall not be less than the amounts determined by the prudential committee of the district, or, if there be no prudential committee, by the water commissioners of the district and the selectmen of the town. If the said prudential committee or water commissioners, as the case may be, and the selectmen cannot agree on the amounts and the commissioner of corporations and taxation is so notified, the said commissioner may determine the amounts and shall notify the assessors who shall include the amounts determined by said commissioner in the aggregate amount assessed annually for district taxes, and the amounts assessed shall be paid said assessors and collector. Said districts may also appropriate money for books, forms and other necessary expenses of said assessors and collectors of taxes in connection with the assessment and collection of such taxes. WATER COMMISSIONERS' REPORT

To the Citizens of the Water District of Acton:

We present our annual report for the year ending March 31st, 1925.

In pursuance of the vote taken at the special meeting held October 8th, 1924, the commissioners petitioned the General Court to extend the bounds of the District as defined in the Article. The petition, known as S. 252, was referred to the Committee on Water Supply, and a hearing was granted us February 3rd. Several citizens of the proposed extension appeared either for or against the petition.

The Committee gave us leave to withdraw February 24th, their action accepted by the Senate February 25th, and by the House March 2nd.

We have carried out as far as possible the instructions given us to extend the 6-inch main in Liberty Street to the Stow line. Work was commenced immediately on learning we could borrow the money as voted, but was materially delayed by failure of pipe being delivered as agreed. Work was continued until cold weather compelled us to stop, and started again early this year.

We are using a precaulked pipe at a considerable saving in time and labor over the old method.

The \$6,000.00 voted was brorowed at $4\frac{1}{4}\%$ per annum, issuing 15 notes of \$400.00 each, payable, one note, annually in from one to fifteen years.
